Why has Wetherby become the most expensive place around to buy fuel? For the whole of January, and most of February, Petrol in Wetherby was 7p per litre more than in Selby, 6p more than Harrogate, even 5p more than Leeds. That means about £4 - £5 more for a tankful, and actually means it is cost effective to drive to Scarcroft or Harrogate purely to fill the car. Crazy. And another thing. My understanding of consumer legislation and monopoly control does not allow collusion between competitors, so how come Shell and Morrisons in Wetherby change their fuel prices by exactly the same amount at the same time.

Our national leaders have declared that only electric or hydrogen cars can be sold from 2035 [or maybe 2032]. Hybrids, the saviours of the planet only last year, will be phased out. Remember the Governments advice to buy diesel cars to save the planet a few years ago? Aside from the problems of re-charging an electric car on a long journey, It seems that the manufacture of a new electric car is more destructive to the planet than allowing an extant petrol or diesel car to run for a few more years.

And one other thing. The Government have declared that all petrol in future will be E10, replacing E5, the current standard. This means that 10% of the petrol will be ethanol, or vegetable oil. The arteries of our older cars may struggle with E10.

My understanding of consumer legislation and monopoly control does not allow collusion between competitors, so how come Shell and Morrisons in Wetherby change their fuel prices by exactly the same amount at the same time.

Our national leaders have declared that only electric or hydrogen cars can be sold from 2035 [or maybe 2032]. Hybrids, the saviours of the planet only last year, will be phased out. Remember the Governments advice to buy diesel cars to save the planet a few years ago? Aside from the problems of re-charging an electric car on a long journey, It seems that the manufacture of a new electric car is more destructive to the planet than allowing an extant petrol or diesel car to run for a few more years.

That means about £4 - £5 more for a tankful, and actually means it is cost effective to drive to Scarcroft or Harrogate purely to fill the car. Crazy. And another thing. My understanding of consumer legislation and monopoly control does not allow collusion between competitors, so how come Shell and Morrisons in Wetherby change their fuel prices by exactly the same amount at the same time.

Our national leaders have declared that only electric or hydrogen cars can be sold from 2035 [or maybe 2032]. Hybrids, the saviours of the planet only last year, will be phased out. Remember the Governments advice to buy diesel cars to save the planet a few years ago? Aside from the problems of re-charging an electric car on a long journey, It seems that the manufacture of a new electric car is more destructive to the planet than allowing an extant petrol or diesel car to run for a few more years.

And one other thing. The Government have declared that all petrol in future will be E10, replacing E5, the current standard. This means that 10% of the petrol will be ethanol, or vegetable oil. The arteries of our older cars may struggle with E10.
