<u>Chairmans Rant</u>

I have now had a chance to drive the classic cars of the (Distant) future, an "All electric" (AE) Tesla and a Petrol Hybrid Electric (PHEV) Range Rover. Overall I am impressed. The acceleration of the AE is phenomenal, better than any petrol or turbo diesel I have ever driven. The PHEV is little different to driving an ordinary automatic car.

The Tesla has a feature which I have only read of. It literally drives itself. On a motorway or well marked road, the car monitors other traffic and road markings, and the driver can sit back and relax, touching the steering wheel every few seconds to let the car know he/she is awake. I was quite apprehensive about this as a passenger, particularly when the driver started to use the car's screen to search for a restaurant with a charging station whilst travelling at 70mph. The cars screens have full internet access and can be used as full rear view mirrors. The Tesla has 2 screens, with touch control for internet connection, sat-nav, music, and many other functions. The main screen is bigger than my laptop. With a range of 400 miles, and fast charging stations at many points of interest such as restaurants, motorway services, shopping centres, long distance driving is quite comfortable. The car can be controlled via a smart phone. Seeing it drive itself out of the garage was a strange experience.

The Range Rover has only a 35 mile range on it's electric motor, but can be set via the touch screen controls to combine petrol and electric usage pushing the mpg up towards 60. There are 3 screens in the RR, with even more options for driving style, road surface type, comfort etc. Just as with the Tesla, there are many opportunities to charge, and the car charges itself on downhill stretches with a lot of braking.

We did find that over reliance on technology can be a concern. If the car electronic key battery fails, and the car is parked in a place such as an underground garage with no mobile phone connection, the car cannot be opened, started or driven at all.

So, will I buy one? If I do, I would prefer an AE, but I do not think a new AE will ever be within my budget. Second hand is questionable according to the experts, as battery life is limited and for replacement batteries I would need a mortgage. Technology will advance, and there may be an opportunity in the future, I shall have to wait and see.
