Chairmans Rant

The European Union have relaxed their approach to banning the sale of new fossil fuel cars from 2035, to allowing the ongoing sale of 'Zero CO2 emitting' cars. Germany pushed for the change, Italy and others abstained from the vote. The UK is still committed to banning the sale of new fossil fuel cars from 2030. The US may decide the matter depending onwhich party controls the administration. The international motor industry sees the future of HGV's as Hydrogen fuel cell rather than electric. It is not clear whether so-called 'Hybrid' cars have a long-term future. It seems that we are destined to confusion for years to come. In any event, if I survive to 2030 or 2035, I may have lost ability to drive.

FBHVC

The Federation of British Historic Vehicle Clubs announced a carbon balancing scheme to the historic vehicle community last December.

Whilst recognising that the carbon footprint of the historic vehicle movement is already immeasurably small, with the entire community accounting for less than 0.25% of the total mileage on UK roads, the offer of carbon balancing has been incredibly well-supported by historic vehicle owners.

The Federation's scheme offers individuals, clubs and those organising events within the historic vehicle community a quick and convenient way to carbon balance their emissions thanks to the planting of new woodland here in the UK. Importantly, that woodland will also be planted using native species to best contribute to the local ecosystem. Planting in this way also brings with it a host of other benefits, including increased biodiversity, creation of recreational spaces and flood mitigation to name a few.

So far since last December the historic vehicle community has successfully carbon balanced 553,564 miles.

Should WCCC take any action to support this scheme? Action would basically be members giving money to support tree planting to balance the carbon emissions of our cars on runs and events.

8 Cars that dared to look different

The Fiat Multipla, in your editor's opinion one of the ugliest cars of all time. There was nothing else remotely like it, six seats in two rows of three certainly made it very different to anything else on the road. It was a popular hire car for family use in it's day.

The Rover P6, It was goodbye to the upright P4 beloved of country solicitors and stuffy bank managers in 1963 and hello fresh. A compact executive sports saloon with racing car-like De Dion rear suspension, four-wheel disc brakes, sporty handling and supportive comfort designed for the new motorway world of all-day cruising at 70mph. Now a genuine classic.





The Alfa Romeo SZ, in 1986, Fiat finally got its hands on its homegrown rival Alfa Romeo. The company needed to build a car to prove Alfa wouldn't become just another sub-brand. The early sketches and ideas for the 75-based SZ came from the wildly unpredictable pen of Fiat design head Robert Opron – who, as instigator of the Citroën SM and Renault Fuego, knew all about boldness. Very rarely seen these days, mostly rotted

away.

The Citroen AMI, Flaminio Bertoni was an artistic genius. He was Italy but found his calling in the Bohemian Paris of the 1930s, Citroën took him on, and he proceeded to designed both the Traction Avant and the Citroen DS. Then he used the 2CV platform create the Ami, which has not become the same revered classic as 2CV. One of our neighbours used one as a greenhouse.



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The Ferrari Testarossa, Leonardo Fioravanti's Testarossa design for Pininfarina is the perfect period piece, well suited to the show Miami Vice in whose later episodes it starred. And just in case this shatters your illusion that the Testarossa was the widest car ever, you could get a Gemballa-modified one pulled out to 210cm – very near the all-time record

The Lotus Europa, Colin Chapman and his disciples just seemed to pull this one out of the hat from nowhere in 1966. How they found the time and the finance to build the Europa defies belief after Lotus had launched the Elan, the Lotus-Cortina, moved factories and made a stunning assault on Formula 1 in quick succession. The Europa could out-perform many 'Supercars'.





The ISO Isetta, There wasn't much in the way of Health & Safety legislation to be considered by the two Italian engineers who came up with the Isetta. The minute three-wheeler with a moped engine powering its single rear wheel caused an absolute sensation in 1953, and building it under licence saved BMW to let it become the company it is today.

The Bond Bug, The man who designed the <u>Bond Bug</u>, Tom Karen OBE, got the chance of a lifetime to do something different as a design consultant thanks to the bravery of his main client Reliant. way to tempt hard-up students into the three-wheeler world, his included all the then-current tropes and motifs of the early 1970s, a psychedelic bright orange colour as standard on the brutal wedge

shape, a lift-up canopy instead of doors to suggest the space age. It was fun and thrifty, for sure, today it has a small but dedicated fan base.
